


### Mazel Tov!

#### This Week, That Thought

Apparently, I have been out of the loop regarding what "Toameha" has become. What I assumed was a small taste of kugel before Shabbos, maybe a bit of cholent, has evolved into an entire culture of not only eating, but of drinking, and drinking heavily. Rabbi Yaakov Bender recently expressed deep disappointment in fathers who gather to drink excessively and the profound impact this has on their teenage children. This is not a minor issue; it is a matter of life and death. Along similar lines, another prominent Ray told his kehillah that if he ever found someone intoxicated at the kiddush, he would personally dispose of every alcoholic beverage in the shul.

When we began our "Whiskey & Wisdom" class, some questioned whether it was appropriate. Were we unintentionally encouraging negative behavior? I see it differently. Yes - creating a drinking culture is wrong, very wrong. And yes - alcohol can be a gateway to dangerous habits and even addiction. But the unfortunate reality is that anyone seeking a drink will have no difficulty finding one. What I see beneath the surface is something deeper: a yearning to connect, to belong, to be part of a chevra.

In a healthy setting, with true moderation, our goal is to create a culture of connection, and one that feels different from a typical shiur. And I believe it's working. People are enjoying themselves, bonding with one another, and engaging with Torah in ways they otherwise might not. We must be vigilant in eliminating harmful drinking and the broader drinking culture, but we also have a responsibility to build a healthier, safer, and more meaningful alternative to belong to.

#### Between the Lines

"וְיָהִי עָשָׁו אִישׁ יֹדְע צִיד, אִישׁ שְׂדָה" Esav was a hunter, a man of the field. From the outset, he was very different from his brother Yaakov, the שֹׁב אֹהְלִים whose life was rooted in the beauty of Torah. Esav, by contrast, was constantly on the move, roaming the outdoors. So why did Yitzchak feel drawn to Esav, the "man of the wild"?

Rav Simcha Zissel Broide zt"l of Chevron explains something familiar to anyone who has a child who doesn't fit the standard yeshiva mold: there are many paths to serving Hashem. The task is to help each person channel their unique strengths and interests toward avodas Hashem. Yitzchak believed he could guide Esav in that direction.

"Most parenting is done by modeling. We must work diligently on refinement of our middos in order to resist the noxious effects of today's hedonistic world, in which we are essentially trying to go up on the "down" escalator."

So what went wrong? Esav was not only a hunter, he was a man of the field. He lived a life without boundaries, without structure, without limits. That lifestyle is fundamentally incompatible with the disciplined framework that Torah demands. The two cannot coexist.

That is the lesson: not everything becomes acceptable simply by attaching it to Torah or mitzvos. Toameha or Kiddush clubs "for the sake of Shabbos," extravagant weddings "for the sake of simchas chosson v'kallah," lavish homes "to host talmidei chachamim"-even noble intentions require boundaries. At some point, we must know where to draw the line.



### Pages of the Past

The Volozhin Yeshiva, founded by Rav Chaim of Volozhin, revived Torah learning by creating a true yeshiva community. Instead of small groups in poor conditions, talmidim now lived together, learned together, and formed strong bonds with their rebbeim, building confidence, joy, and accomplishment.

In the late 1800s, under the Netziv and the Beis HaLevi, student-led clubs began to emerge. Torah remained the absolute center of life, learning continued 24/7, 365 days a year, but the student-initiated club still seeped in. Clubs like Netzach Yisroel (promoting love of every Jew), Ner Tziyonah (love of Eretz Yisroel, pre- Secular Zionism), took shape. Though not opposed in principle, the Roshei Yeshiva eventually closed them due to Russian pressure and concerns of Bitul Torah.

While far from today's Toameha, this history highlights a simple truth: talmidim crave chevra—a deeper sense of belonging and connection.



#### For the Table

- Is the shul meant to function like a JCC, creating a social circle where people simply enjoy each other's company? Or is its purpose solely Torah, mitzvos, and tefillah?
- At what point does our effort to elevate the spiritual through food, drink, and aesthetics cross the line, becoming less about honoring Hashem and more about satisfying our own desires?
